

The second quarter of 2024 saw a marked increase in Single Family Dwellings, Secondary Suites, and Residential Additions.



The uptick in account creation for MyLakeCountry continued from Q1 2024 through Q2. Online statements and accounts continue to be a popular offering for our constituents.





Accounts Payable






Accounts Receivable






Taxation and Collection




The collection of 2024 property taxes has shown a slightly slower pace compared to 2023, with 83.82% collected by the deadline this year, versus 84.7% last year. This minor year-over-year variance is typical and well within the range of normal fluctuations of collection. Overall, the property tax collection is consistent with the previous year, and this slight variation is not outside the expected range.
